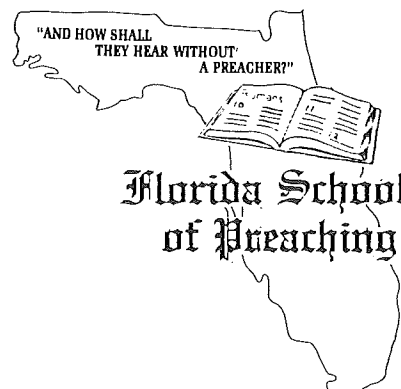

What You May Expect At The Florida School of Preaching

Anyone contemplating attending a school has a right to know what is expected of them as well as what to expect from the institution. In view of this I wish to reflect upon some things a student may anticipate who attends the *Florida School of Preaching*.

Respect for the Bible

Any school proposing to prepare men to preach the truth must have a profound respect for the Bible. You may expect the Bible to be taught, memorized and defended.

We know full well that a variety of views are provided with most any verse or idea in the Bible. Truth (what does the Bible teach), and not a variety of opinions is our goal. We know the Bible teaches that God's ways and man's ways are not always the same. *"For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways, saith the LORD. For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways, and my thoughts than your thoughts"* (Isa. 55:8-9).

Therefore, we are to *"Buy the truth, and sell it not; also wisdom, and instruction, and understanding"* (Prov. 23:23).

As God is our helper we shall ever propose this as our guiding philosophy; the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth.

Love for the Church

If we are to judge by the writing and actions of some in the church we must conclude that their attitude appears to be that of bitterness and ill will toward the church. With such persons we refuse to be associated.

We are concerned for the church that Jesus died to purchase (Eph. 5:25). We respect the Bible and know that it teaches that there is but one body (Eph. 4:4) and that

this one body is the church (Eph. 1:22-23).

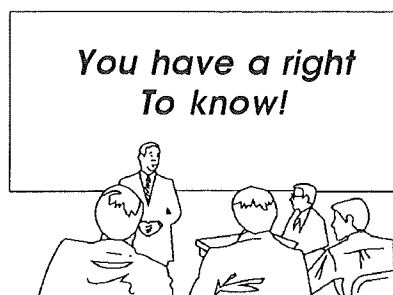
The church of Christ is unique. No other institution known to man has such a high and holy calling. To not know and identify with the church for which Jesus died is to make a decision with grave consequences.

Those who would teach that one church is as good as another, and that God and the Christ are as pleased when we are in man made Churches as they are when we are in His blood bought body, are being irresponsible teachers.

We can know the truth and the truth will make us free (John 8:32). We know the truth about the church and will not permit another to take us captive to his vain philosophy developed from the foolish imaginations of disobedient men (Col. 2:8).

Love for the Lost

Because of our respect for the Bible we know that men are lost without the good news (the gospel). Men sin when they disobey God. Men disobey God when



they fail to obey his word, the Bible. Men who disobey his word, the Bible need forgiveness. Men who need forgiveness are throughout the world. Wherever we find men the gospel is needed.

The training of preachers will be appreciated when we understand the need of men in sin. To close our minds to men in sin is not to love them.

Jesus said that one has no greater love than to lay down his life for a friend (John 15:13). We propose to make a sacrifice for others because we know his sacrifice for us. We propose to sacrifice for others because we seek to be His friend. He that loved us has called upon us to love others as he loved us "A new commandment I give unto you, That ye love one another; as I have loved you, that ye also love one another. By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples, if ye have love one to another" (John 13:34-35).

Love for the Students

Students should expect the school to have a godly interest in them. We desire for them to be the best they can be. The best they can be in the service of their King. Their king is not satisfied when they are indifferent to His Word and His cause. We are concerned for them and for all that they may teach in the future. We propose to have the same loving interest in the students that Paul had for the brethren in Corinth (II Cor. 11:1-3).

Great joy is realized when you are able to observe the growth of those that you love in the Lord. The Apostle John stated that it was the greatest of his joys (III John 4).

Fellowship

Students attending the school are viewed as fellow travelers in the cause of truth (III John

8). We see ourselves as fellow workers and fellow helpers for the cause of the Christ.

Because of the concern that fellow travelers have there is a bond of love and unity that develops among us. As we part company at graduation time the fellowship that has been established will go with each of us on our journey.

When the traveling days are over we rest assured that in His fellowship we shall ever abide. The fellowship that is developed at school will last forever.

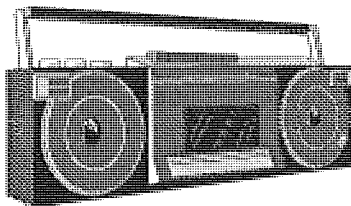

I have a great desire to reach through the radio thousands of Kreol (Creole) speaking people living in central Florida. The radio program that I have every Saturday morning on WVCF brings good feedback. Questions that have been asked proves to me that the thinking about the church of Christ is changing, and this motivates me to try to stay on the air. For example: After a lesson on the importance of water baptism in the plan of salvation, a 60 year old Catholic man called and said, "If what the Bible says about water baptism is so, I am lost because I have never been taught that way."

I do need support to continue this program. A one hour program will help me to have 30 minutes for questions and answers
